ZOOM (NOT SO SCARY) TIPS AND TRICKS by Sara Schmitt

As we prepare for our second ever hybrid **NWV AAUW meeting on Thursday**, here are some tips and tricks to get the most out of your Zoom experience.

- 1. **MUTE** stay on mute if you won't be talking! That way no one can hear your dog, doorbell, or husband in the background. It happens more than you think!
- 2. **VIDEO** to turn your mute or video on or off, hover your cursor at the bottom left-hand corner of your computer screen. When listening to a speaker, feel free to cover your camera or turn your video off.
- 3. **SCREEN VIEW** In the upper right-hand corner of your screen you can choose speaker view or gallery. Speaker view will allow you to see only the person speaking.
- 4. **CHAT** during presentations you can use the chat to ask questions of the speaker. In the upper right-hand corner of your computer screen exit full screen. Then hover your cursor at the bottom of the screen in the center and click chat.
- 5. **HEADSET OR HEADPHONES** I like to use a headset when I am on Zoom so others at my home aren't bothered by my meetings. It also may be easier to hear the meeting!
- 6. **CHANGING YOUR NAME** Right click on your name in your picture. Choose rename and type in your full name so that everyone knows who you are!

MORE ZOOM TIPS

How to Join a ZOOM Meeting

- 1. First, go to zoom and sign up for a free account. A shortcut should automatically be put on your desktop.
- 2. When you receive an email with an invitation to join a meeting, just click on the blue link in the email at the time scheduled.
- 3. Follow the prompts when asked about joining the meeting, using your computer audio and video.
- 4. Once in the meeting, click on the mic icon at the bottom left of your video picture if there is a red line through it.
- 5. Want to change your name on your session's video picture? Right click on it and rename.
- 6. Continue by trying out all the options and tabs, with a friend.

How To Host A ZOOM Meeting:

- 1. Click on the ZOOM Desktop Icon, shortcut, or icon
- 2. Click on Schedule
- 3. Fill in Topic (optional) if you wish.
- 4. Scroll to When and enter Date and Time of your meeting
- 5. Duration is 40 minutes (can be repeated by host ending meeting and clicking email link again).
- 6. Next to Video, make sure to choose Host and Participant as On; then Click on Save.
- 7. On the page that opens, Click on Copy Invitation and right click on Copy (in some cases a page opens that asks you once again to Click on Copy Invitation.
- 8. Paste the invitation in a composed email and send it to yourself and all participants. Keep that email handy in case you have to restart a meeting, or get lost in the various tabs during a meeting.

Presentation

- 1. Remember that you are on camera.
- 2. Keep the background presentable also, with no open doors, distractions, clutter, etc.
- 3. Make sure you have a good light source in front of you. Turn off any ceiling fan that can be seen.
- 4. Don't be fidgety. Any kind of movement is noticeable to all.
- 5. Be polite and take turns. Do not interrupt others.
- 6. Let the Host control the conversation "flow." The Host will recognize you if you raise your hand.

September—Building a More Resilient Immune System



We had a fantastic kick-off to our 20/21 season with our first speaker **Melissa Diluzio** from Surprise, Arizona, appearing by Zoom! **Melissa**, a Certified Integrative Nutrition and Wellness Coach, BBA, AADP, gave us a great overview of our immune systems and some tips for improving our health. Melissa offers complimentary 30-minute sessions to anyone interested in learning about how Health Coaching can improve their health. She shared a quote from Ann Wigmore that states . . .

"The food you eat can be either the safest and most powerful form of medicine or the slowest form of poison."

We had close to 40 people who joined by Zoom including some who were in much cooler locations like Minnesota. Everyone did a great job of asking questions using the chat box to get the conversation going.

October—For the Love of Turquoise



Our October speaker was **Carrie Cannon** who is an Ethnobotanist for the Hualapai Tribe of Peach Springs, Arizona. She works to ensure ethnobotanical knowledge is preserved and passed down to new generations. She spoke about the traditions of Turquoise among cultures of the Southwest and the world. **Carrie** is a member of the Kiowa tribe of Oklahoma and is also of Oglala Lakota descent. She has a B.S. in Wildlife Biology, and an M.S. in Resource Management. She began working for the Hualapai Tribe of Peach Springs, Arizona, in 2005 where she began the creation of an intergenerational ethnobotany program for the Hualapai community.

Turquoise has a long-standing tradition amongst Native cultures of the Southwest, holding special significance and profound meanings to specific individual tribes. Found on six continents across the world, turquoise forms in arid regions through the process of water seeping through rock and interacting with copper, aluminum, and iron deposits. In the southwest, used decoratively for millennia, this iconic art form has a compelling story all its own. This talk explored a long tradition of distinctive cultural styles, history, and transition of this wondrous stone.



COVID 19 Etiquette

Masks

Out in public; wear a mask as virus droplets can travel MORE than 6 to 12 feet. **Someone not wearing a mask or wearing it incorrectly,** Choose your battles—a good response is "OOPS, it looks like your mask slipped."

Handwashing

Use hot water and soap, lather up about 6 inches above your arm while singing "Happy Birthday" twice

Greeting People

Namaste works. Bow and place hands in prayer position; this is done at a distance, no elbow bumps.

Elevators

A short trip is LOW risk if everyone is wearing a mask

Payments

Cash/check/credit cards—pay by credit card and always thank the staff

Sneezing

Sneeze into mask; this keeps the particles contained and away from others. Replace with clean one and <u>ALWAYS</u> carry more than one clean one

In the grocery aisle, don't bother, just move or keep your distance unless the person is acting irrationally or in an unsafe manner. Call the manager.

John Hopkins Information on Corona Virus from NY Times by Sharon-Lee Astle

Every day, some 43,000 new cases are being reported!

- This virus is not a living organism. It is a protein molecule (RNA or DNA) covered by a protective layer of lipid (fat), which, when absorbed by the cells of the ocular (eyes), nasal (nose) or buccal mucosa (mouth), changes their genetic code (mutates) and converts into aggressor and multiplier cells.
- Since the virus is not a living organism, but is a protein molecule, it cannot be killed. It has to decay on its own. The disintegration time depends on the temperature, humidity and type of material where it lies.
- The virus is very fragile; the only thing that protects it is a thin outer layer of fat, and that is the reason why soap or detergent is the best weapon. The foam CUTS THE FAT (that is why you have to scrub for 20 seconds or more, to create lots of foam). By dissolving the fat layer, the protein molecule disperses and breaks down.
- → HEAT melts fat; this is why it is necessary to use water above 77degrees for hand washing, laundry and cleaning surfaces. In addition, hot water makes more foam, making it more effective.
- Alcohol or any mixture with alcohol over 65% DISSOLVES ALL FAT, especially the external lipid layer of the virus.
- Any solution with 1 part bleach and 5 parts water directly dissolves the protein, breaking it down from the inside.
- Oxygenated water increases the effectiveness of soap, alcohol and chlorine, because peroxide dissolves the virus protein. However, because you have to use it in its pure form, it can damage your skin.
- NO BACTERICIDE OR ANTIBIOTIC WILL WORK because the virus is not a living organism like bacteria; antibodies cannot kill what is not alive.

- ♣ The virus molecules remain very stable at colder temperatures, including air conditioning in houses and cars. They also need moisture and darkness to stay stable. Therefore, dehumidified, dry, warm and bright environments will degrade the virus faster.
- UV LIGHT on any object that may contain the virus breaks down the protein. Be careful, it also breaks down collagen (which is protein) in the skin.
- The virus CANNOT go through healthy skin.
- Vinegar is NOT useful because it does not break down the protective layer of fat.
- NO SPIRITS, NOR VODKA, serve. The strongest vodka is only 40% alcohol, and you need a minimum of 65%.
- ♣ LISTERINE is 65% alcohol.
- The more confined the space, the higher the concentration of the virus there can be. The more open or naturally ventilated, the less.
- ➡ You have to wash your hands before and after touching any commonly used surfaces such as: mucosa (mouth area), food, locks, knobs, switches, remotes, cell phones, watches, computers, desks, etc. . . and don't forget when you use the bathroom.
- You have to MOISTURIZE YOUR HANDS due to frequent washing. Dry hands have cracks and the molecules can hide in the micro cracks The thicker the moisturizer, the better.
- Also keep your NAILS SHORT so that the virus does not hide there.



WOMEN SCHOLARS DURING COVID: SOLUTIONS FOR GENDER EQUITY IN ACADEMIA

Jessica Malisch is one we have supported in Research, and she shares what her work with 17 other academics exploring gender issues has discovered:

- ✓ Diversity: We must have gender Equality. COVID has added to the work load, and children are at home. Increased mentoring load.
- ✓ We have a Leaky Pipeline MORE women than men graduate from college About the same women and men graduate with Master's Degree Women are NOT equal in PhD and in Research (28%)
- ✓ Women with children are less likely to get tenure and promotion Need summer salary for Research Need compensation for child care In times of stress there is Biased Decision-Making Power Therefore Equity given less time, and this will:

JOB DESCRIPTION


- Receives all contact information AFTER the Membership Committee has thoroughly processed and sent information to appropriate leaders (including SIGS).





NCCWSL Information and Application

AAUW National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL)

May 26-29, 2021

University of Maryland in College Park, Maryland

In 2019, 800 students attended NCCWSL.

The AAUW website has information about registration, costs, the agenda, and scholarships. Go to: "Attend NCCWSL - AAUW" for the details.

On **November 2**, **Early Bird registration opens**. This approach will save a student \$100 off the cost of the regular registration fee of \$585. Also available at the website is the application for a national NCCWSL Scholarship. This scholarship could cover the cost of the entire registration.

AAUW-AZ has two awards available for Arizona college or university students to attend NCCWSL. Each award is worth \$1,500/student to cover the cost of the registration fee and travel expenses. The student must pay for the conference and travel costs out of pocket before attending the conference. They will be reimbursed upon their return and submitting their receipts. See the attached NCCWSL application. Completed applications are due by January 15, 2021. This conference is considered the premier event for college women in the United States and globally. Please encourage students at your local colleges and universities to apply.

The NWV branch College Connection Team is in the process of establishing a partnership with the YWCA Metro Phoenix. A virtual panel discussion program is in the planning stages and will cover topics of interest for college students such as the pay gap, wage negotiation, college debt, and balancing family, job and classes. The panelists will include: Sara Tyree, our NWV branch member; Alexis HermosillC, Mayor of the City of El Mirage; and Lisa Cagnolatti, executive-in-residence for the MBA program at ASU. The program, via Zoom, is scheduled Thursday, November 19, 2020, from 3:00 to 4:00 P.M.. Some NWV branch members are participating in the YWCA's <u>21 Day Challenge</u>.

For Week #4, the focus was on "The Economics of Being a Women". The challenge on Day #17 was about How Student Loans Affect Women. AAUW reported that women hold approximately 2/3 of student debt in the nation and struggle more to pay it off - in part because of the gender pay gap. AAUW was credited with being a partner with the YWCA and provided their policy recommendations on ways to lower the student loan debt of women. College graduates are considering delaying marriage, starting a family and buying a home because of their student loan debt.
